KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

Hollingsworth's address entitled "Spirituality, Compassion, and the Social Brain" will focus on her work with Interpersonal neurobiology (IPNB), a burgeoning interdisciplinary field that focuses on ways in which relationships shape and transform the architecture and functioning of the human brain. IPNB points to four specific conditions that appear to encourage the emergence of empathy. Further, these conditions, when gathered together, may constitute the core components of a "spirituality of compassion".

Andrea Hollingsworth holds an M.A. in Marriage and Family Therapy from Bethel University (St. Paul, MN), and is currently a Ph.D. student in Constructive Theology at Loyola University Chicago. Her research interests include interdisciplinary method, interpersonal neurobiology, feminism, altruism, spirit, and spirituality. Her dissertation explores ways in which relational ambiguity mediates the experience of the divine. Hollingsworth has presented scholarly papers at local, national, and international academic conferences, and has published book reviews and papers in several peer-reviewed journals.
